## He must rise again from the dead

On the first day of the week, Mary of Magdala came to the tomb early in the morning, while it was still dark, and saw the stone removed from the tomb. So she ran and went to Simon Peter and to the other disciple whom Jesus loved, and told them, "They have taken the Lord from the tomb, and we don't know where they put him."

So Peter and the other disciple went out and come to the tomb. They both ran, but the other disciple ran faster than Peter and arrived at the tomb first; he bent down and saw the burial cloths there, but did not go in.

# Easter $\mathcal{E}$ Entropy 

When we study physics, we learn about the second law of thermodynamics, also known as the concept of "entropy." Entropy is a scientific term for something we know by experience: things break down. Everything created has a lifespan, whether it be a machine, a building, a sun, or a galaxy. And no source of energy is $100 \%$ efficient. The Bible expresses this notion in various places, but especially at the end of Psalm 102: "Of old You did lay the foundation of the earth, and the heavens are the work of your hands. They will perish, but you endure; they will all wear out like a garment. You change them like raiment, and they pass away; but You are the same, and your years have no end" (Ps 102:25-27). This psalm highlights both (1) that wearing-down is an inherent property to creation (entropy), and (2) that God is not subject to this wearingdown.

For those who don't believe in God, everything without exception is subject to entropy, even the universe itself. Entropy functions, then, as a kind of "death warrant" on the universe. It is built in obsolescence. Apart from God, then, there is no ultimate hope. The universe, left to itself, would eventually peter out. And the whole of human history would be the smallest blip, and a meaningless one, on the wide radar of human and cosmic history.

But because God exists, there is a glimmer of hope that not everything ends in death. God Himself is spared from wear-out. He is an exception to entropy. Still, what good does that do us if we are subject to entropy? This is where the relevance of the Resurrection enters in. In His Resurrection, we see Jesus overcoming sin, suffering, death, and every form of entropy that assails us. In Jesus, we see an exception to entropy within our own creation and history. And Jesus offers us hope, declaring that those who believe and follow Him until death will receive "the crown of life": "Be faithful unto death, and I will give you the crown of life" (Rev 2:10). Christ has come to save us from sin, from suffering, and from death being our ultimate end. Because of His Resurrection, eternal life is possible and accessible to us. Because of His Resurrection, life and everything that we do (which is good) can have meaning and value. His Resurrection gives us ultimate hope, a hope that not based on just wishful and optimistic thinking, but a hope which is as real as His Resurrection. Blessed hope to all of you! Blessed Easter! Jesus Christ is risen. Amen. Alleluia!
